



## **ABOUT HAREWOOD**

Harewood House Trust is an educational charity which attracts around 250,000 visitors every year. It is one of England's finest 18th Century country houses, set in over 100 acres of beautiful grounds and gardens. An accredited museum it is also the family seat of the Earl and Countess of Harewood.

Harewood House was built using profits made from the Transatlantic trade in enslaved people and its associated industries. Today, Harewood is a safe place in which we can have open conversations about our past and bring communities together, using our history as a means of working together for a better society.

Alongside the care, conservation and interpretation of its core collections, Harewood curates innovative and ever-changing exhibitions, celebrating and collaborating with a diverse range of individuals and groups.

Through its trading operation the Trust manages and delivers major outdoor events, conferences, corporate functions, fine dining, cafés and other retail and food outlets throughout the site.

The Trust has great ambitions for Harewood's future, as well as celebrating its fascinating past. It has recently embarked on an exciting major project to reimagine its key historic landscape and gardens, build a new playground and create a new visitor welcome centre. All designed to grow our audiences, generate new income and provide an excellent visitor experience.

## **OUR VOLUNTEER PROGRAMME**

At Harewood, our volunteering programme has been running for over twenty five years and we currently have around 200 volunteers. Our vision is to create a sector-leading, inclusive, and sustainable volunteering programme that meets the needs of the Trust and provides a positive volunteer experience for people of all ages, ethnicities, and abilities. Volunteers are pivotal to our aims and aspirations. We love involving volunteers in the work we do be that engaging with visitors, caring for our gardens and collections, running our Secondhand Bookshop, driving our electric shuttles, helping operate our ferry and assisting with delivering our learning programme.

Volunteers bring a wealth of experience and get involved for many varied reasons; including a love of heritage and gardens, to gain employability skills, and for social contact. At Harewood, we feel that we have created a safe welcoming space, where volunteers can flourish, contribute meaningfully and feel a sense of belonging. We want to give opportunities to as wide a range of people as possible and help volunteers in their aims as much as they support us in ours.



## **VOLUNTEER GARDENS ASSISTANT**

#### INTRODUCTION

The Gardens at Harewood are set within 1,000 acres of ornamental parkland laid out during the 18th century in the 'English' style. A number of landscape gardeners have been involved in shaping Harewood's landscape over time, but it is the work and the style of Lancelot 'Capability' Brown (c.1716 – 1783) that Harewood is renowned for. The Gardens per se comprise three main horticultural areas, each one different in style and content and containing a diverse range of plants throughout:

#### **Terrace**

A high Victorian, Italianate formal garden, complete with C19 parterre created by Sir Charles Barry (1795 – 1860), complete with fountains, clipped yew and box, hornbeam stilt hedges, planting schemes, large-scale mixed flower borders, including the Archery Border, planted on a broadly sub-tropical theme with architectural plants.

#### Walled Garden

An ornamental and utilitarian garden of 3 acres, built in the 1750s and divided into two parts, with a productive kitchen garden, flower borders, apple orchard, meadow, frame yard & glasshouses (awaiting restoration) and Bothy tearoom. Experimental elements recently introduced to the kitchen garden include the environmentally responsible production of vegetable crops and re-invigoration of soil-borne ecosystems through the 'no-dig' systems, plus the recycling and processing of compostable green waste.

# Himalayan Garden

Featuring a rock garden created for HRH Princess Mary's rock garden in the 1930s, a naturalistic dell garden with waterfall and stream, woodland and bog gardens, containing a thematic plant collection; including trees and shrubs, rhododendrons, alpines and herbaceous plants from Asia – especially the Sino-Himalaya.

### **Grounds**

Adjoining the gardens are 130 acres of historic parkland, complete with a 32-acre lake enclosed by woodlands and arboreta, interconnecting walks, play areas, picnic sites and lakeside woodland gardens with a Rhododendron collection.

# WHAT'S INVOLVED?

Volunteers support our Gardens Team with the seasonal management and maintenance of the three gardened areas: the Terrace, Himalayan Garden and Walled Garden.

You'll be located throughout the gardens, according to priorities, in whichever area requires assistance. As you learn more about the gardens you may prefer one particular area over another.
